2022 Report to District Conference Rob Storey, District Superintendent

CELEBRATIONS

We have much to celebrate since we last gathered as a District family!

- Despite COVID, you have helped plant five new churches in the past two years through your faithful giving to the District Advancement Fund. We're pleased to share there are two new plants in the pipeline for the coming year.
- Four Disciplemaking Discipleship seminars, comprised of leadership teams from 24 District churches, were held for the purpose of pursuing the mandate to create a disciplemaking culture in our ministry settings.
- Several partnerships have been developed between District churches and our
 District international workers. Two post-COVID, District-sponsored mission trips
 took place with leaders from four churches visiting a field, and a newly appointed
 IW couple had opportunity to travel and become better acquainted with their
 prospective field. Four couples are preparing to head to the mission field from the
 MidAmerica District!
- Forty-six new workers joined our District family since April 2020. This includes three new lead pastors in rural Nebraska churches who have been without shepherds for quite some time!
- Co-laboring with six other district leadership teams in the Alliance Central Region
 has been impactful as we work together to reach the 80 million who reside in this
 area. We celebrate the 24,000 members of our MidAmerica District churches who
 live among the 19 million in need of the hope of Jesus.

These are some of the highlights I have the privilege of sharing with you. I would encourage you to take a few minutes and review the updates provided in this Conference report which focus on life and ministry changes in the District family.

CHALLENGES

Raising up new workers for the LORD's harvest field continues to be a major challenge. We are finding fewer men and women from our colleges pursuing the ministry positions we need to fill. We are asking for your help and encouraging you to identify men and women who are clearly called to vocational ministry. Our churches and ministries must help identify, equip, and launch the called ones into ministry roles.

The ongoing conversation regarding men and women's roles in church leadership continues to be a topic of discussion in many of our District churches and ministries. We will spend time at Conference, both on Monday as a District family and on Tuesday when President Stumbo leads us in a final national conversation, continuing to work through this key issue for our movement and our District. My prayer is we will be unified in mission despite our differing views on this topic.

CHANGES

It is often said people do not like change. I would disagree as I have found there are many changes we actually enjoy. As we moved from place to place in the military, our family appreciated the change of culture, scenery, and adventures that came with a new place. It's apparent by our closet (one side much fuller than the other!) that we like options to dress for different occasions! We really love the change of seasons we have the opportunity to observe here in the Midwest.

As the MidAmerica District family anticipates changes over the next six months, there is much for which we can be excited. I believe with all my heart the changes on the horizon will be good for the District's Kingdom advancement in our five-state region. Pending the outcome of our elections and based on my experience in working with Kent Sovine these past six years, as the nominee for District Superintendent I am encouraged with the vision and perspective Kent brings. New District team members working with DEXCOM and LO&CC will bring a fresh approach towards licensed leader support, better missional engagement, and better multiplication efforts.

One area of change we tend not to relish is loss. In our upcoming transition we will be losing very valuable staff members. Kathy Herbranson is retiring to be full-time grandma after 17 years of serving our District family. Rob Douglas will be leaving as he pursues other ministry opportunities. I will return to Grand Junction as we make the DS transition. With these three staff changes, Kent and Kay will be the remaining staff in the office for a period of time. We are grateful to Dan Cutler and Jane Samson who will continue to provide oversight of the District's finances.

As your Superintendent, I am asking all of you to pray for wisdom and discernment for District leadership as we try to manage change and do our very best to make this transition as seamless as possible. Pray we are listening to the Father's voice. Pray these months will be marked by testimonies of the Holy Spirit showing up as we grow in our dependence on Him. Pray advancing the name of Jesus in all our Acts 1:8 environments will grow in effectiveness. The new DS will have the privilege of building a new team. Pray for wisdom as this team is built.

In the midst of the changes before us, one thing does not change...our need to live out God's call on our lives as His Kingdom servants. The 2022 District Conference theme is *Worthy of our Calling*. On Tuesday morning of Conference, Rob Douglas, Kent, and I will share stories of men and women faithfully living out this divine call on their lives in exciting and unique ways.

It has been a privilege to walk with you and our churches as your District Superintendent over the past six years. The Apostle Paul certainly expresses my heart in stating, "I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now, being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus (Philippians 1:3-6)." Lyn and I are committed to continuing to pray for you as we live out our call together. Thank you for being part of our MidAmerica District family.

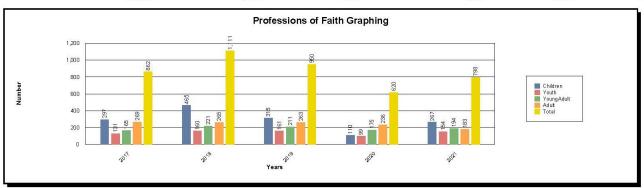

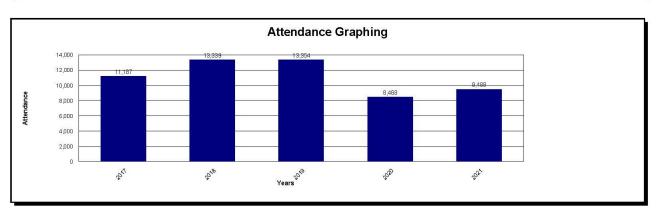

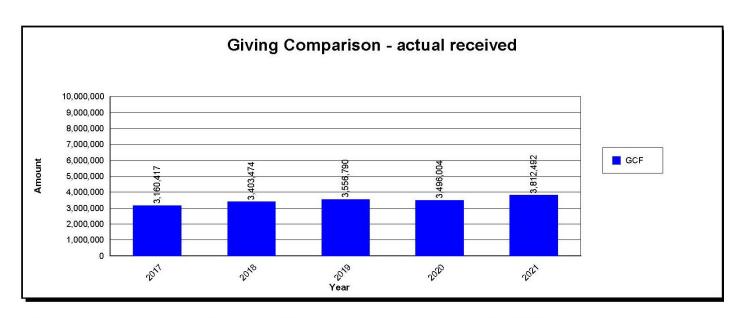

Audit Review

The District financial records have been kept under the supervision of the auditing firm of Lutz & Company, PC, of Omaha, Nebraska. They have prepared the closing statements for the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 2021.

The C&MA Board of Directors requires all districts to submit audited financial statements once every four years, with reviewed financial statements submitted in years an audit is not required. The Board of Directors also requires all C&MA districts to have membership with the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability (ECFA) prior to and remain in compliance with their standards.

Proposed 2022-2023 Budget

The proposed 2022-2023 budget was adopted by DEXCOM and is referred to District Conference for approval. We are eager to see how the Lord directs these resources in the coming year as we continue the work of seeing every man, woman, and child across MidAmerica have opportunity to know Jesus! Join us as we trust the Lord for His provision.

We would like to highlight several budget changes:

- The anticipated **Total Income** is roughly \$100,000 less than last year due to a couple of churches who have left the Alliance. While we are aware this decrease is coming, we also see a path forward that will allow our work to continue with fervency. We are praying giving to the District Advancement Fund by our District churches will meet our total funding needs, and at the same time, are incredibly grateful for the response of some in the District who have already stepped in to help make up the loss (notice the line item called **Extra District Investment!**).
- Part of the decrease on the expenditure side of the budget is due to the shifting of
 personnel in the District Office. While there will be a season of a much smaller team, the
 anticipation is that the District Office team will be rebuilt in the very near future as the
 Lord leads.
- A second decrease in next year's budget is in Global Missions. We budgeted \$16,000 less in this line item to reflect more accurately what we believe is needed in the coming year. We find ourselves in a unique year in which we do not have any of our District international workers returning on home assignment. This is great news for their teams on the field, but will impact us and have implications on our mission events/tours for

our churches. We have also experienced the current challenges of international travel and want to be wise in our approach to this. We look forward to taking more teams to engage with our international workers in the near future, and we anticipate this fund needing to rise again as the world continues to open back up. The encouragement from the District Office will be ever increasing engagement in global efforts. We look forward to seeing more of our churches entering partnerships with District international workers, and we look forward to continued care and support for these workers.

Lastly, the Greenhouse Environment/Residencies line item has decreased \$17,000. This
is due to newly developed funding streams for residencies that will allow for a far greater
investment in the future. These new funding options will be highlighted at the
conference!

As per District bylaw, church contributions to the District Operating Budget are 6% of the District churches' undesignated general operating fund. We are most grateful for your continued, faithful giving making possible the ministries of the MidAmerica District.

We continue to be extremely grateful to Jane Samson for her excellent accounting services rendered on behalf of the District. In spite of challenging health issues, Jane continued to serve with thoroughness and competency for which we are most appreciative. We are trusting the Lord with Jane for His continual healing and ask for your prayers on her behalf as well.

INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REVIEW REPORT

District Women's Retreat

Eastern Retreat (October 22-24) – Held at Carol Joy Holling Conference Center, Ashland, NE. Thirty-two ladies registered to spend at least one night (8 churches) plus 13-day attenders (3 churches). Lisa Meiners of Deeper Still Ministries, was our speaker. Teri Perrotto shared regarding Envision-Miami. Saturday morning breakout sessions were led by Tina Hernandez (Benson), Cindy Pals (Dover), Teri Perrotto, and Kitty Nevius (Fremont). Margie Alford (Providence) led worship. We reserved Carol Joy Holling for September 23-25, 2022, with Stacy Douglas as our speaker.

Western Retreat (Nov 5-7 in Frisco, CO) – Held at the Grand Hotel and Rocky Mountain Bible Church. We had 43 women participate with Stacy Douglas as our speaker. A team from Grand Junction led the worship. Bridget Webster (Clayhouse) presented part of the "Belong" PowerPoint for one session, and we watched a video session from IF:Gathering 2021 by John Mark Comer.

International Workers

We currently support 24 family units with prayer and finances. We prepare and distribute monthly prayer calendars and prayer requests. We have seven churches serving 28 IW children through the Third Culture Kid program. This program connects churches to one or more TCKs for the purpose of prayer, gifts, and correspondence. All our TCKs are currently "adopted."

Financial support of IWs. There is a continual need for Care Funds (formerly Outfit Fund) to provide yearly gifts to the IWs sent from our district. We disperse available Care Funds to all IWs from our district on an annual basis. In 2021-2022 we gave each IW unit \$300 for a total of \$6,000. We gave \$500 each to two IW high school graduates. We gave \$50 each to two IWs who had a parent pass away. We gave \$1,141.41 to the National AW Ministry. In June 2021, we gave \$9,115.96 to the National projects. Our AW churches donated \$1,935.04 to the Young family to help with their travel expenses.

Encouraging Women in Leadership Ministry

District Leadership team members call pastors' wives and women's ministry leaders once every-other-month for the purpose of encouragement and prayer. We currently have four callers who are contacting approximately 30 leaders. Please contact Peggy at pschlieker@cox.net if you would like to be contacted through this ministry.

Met with the District Leadership team via Zoom several times.

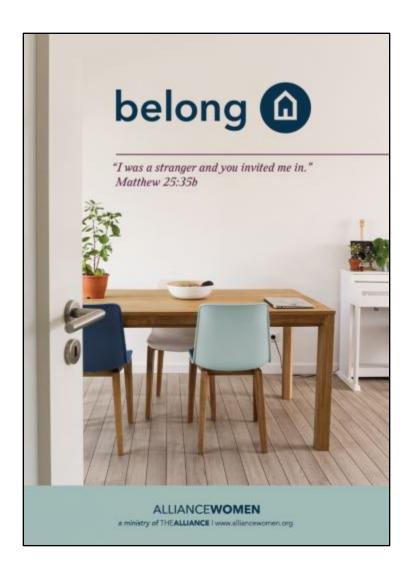

2022 MidAmerica District Conference Report

Has it been two years or twenty? The time has both flown by and, at times, taken forever as we navigated a pandemic for the first time in well over a century. It has been very difficult, and yet had its silver linings. When I reported to you two years ago, we were wondering if summer camp would happen. Here's an update.

Recap

The summer of 2020 was touch and go throughout. We canceled our June camps and invited families to rent our facilities and use our activities. We did host our July camps which were well attended, but not our normal numbers. Our summer staff was not allowed to leave the property which was a challenge for everyone. Chapel services were held outside, masks and social distancing were implemented, and cleaning protocols were increased. We concluded that month

of summer camps without a single case of COVID being contracted on site!

We refunded every dollar for camps canceled or parents simply weren't comfortable sending their kids. This put us in a significant financial deficit, but God didn't leave us there. Through the generosity of several churches and individuals, we had the largest fundraising year in the history of Camp Rivercrest and ended the year in the black – praise God!!



Through the fall of 2020 and the spring

of 2021, our guest group numbers fluctuated and were ultimately much smaller than average. The 2021 summer camp registrations were average for pre-Covid numbers (1,042), and on average the summer felt normal. Worship services were outside, and the mask mandate was lifted although the majority of our activities are outside.

Over the last two summers 199 campers made first time decisions to follow Christ and hundreds more recommitted to their walk with Christ!

Capital Improvements

As we entered the fall of 2021, \$100,000 was needed to meet our budget, and the Lord provided! In looking back on this season, the lesson I learned was you can't predict how the money will come in, or how God will motivate people to give. It was fun to watch, albeit a bit scary.

As we rebuild the donor base and people continue to give, we've been able to make some much needed improvements. The interior of our office is getting refreshed, and we've installed a new water treatment system and wellhead. We replaced the pool vacuum, bought new picnic tables, and ran electrical to our outdoor stage. We laid fiber optic cable to three buildings which results in reliable high speed internet and new VoIP phones.

Staffing

We've had some staffing changes over the last couple of years and made some changes to the org chart as well. Jeff Rhoads, who is not new to camp, is now our full time Operations Director. In April, we've hired Tom Frank as a second staff in maintenance, and Noah Vance will fill our Program Manager position which was vacated for almost two years.



2022 Summer Camps

Summer 2022 registrations have been record-setting despite the 20% increase in camp fees. Early bird registration opened on November 1, offering a 10% discount if fees were paid in full. We had 438 campers register before the end of the month. Our current summer camp registration is 1,049 with 118 on waiting lists. This already exceeds last year and puts us well on our way to an incredible summer.

As always, thanks for what you do. Your ministry is so important, and we're grateful to partner with you. Please let us know if we can serve your church in any way. If you need a place to recharge, take a hike, write, or just listen to the Lord, let us know. We'd be delighted to host you.

2022 MidAmerica District Conference Report

The mission of Global Friends is to bring in, build up and send out international students to the nations. We long to see international students in Omaha and throughout the District gathered into a community where they are introduced to Jesus, built up by learning to obey all that He commanded, and sent out to their home countries at the completion of their studies with skills and a vision to plant churches. We pray every week asking God to send us the hardest to reach people groups from countries where traditional church planting methods are blocked. God faithfully answers that prayer every week as the vast majority of students we interact with are from the Middle East, various African countries, Japan, China, and India.

Omaha Ministry Update

Bring In

The UNO Intensive Language Program (ILUNO). The university invited our team to come and lead an English discussion in one of their classes and facilitate discussion. They gave us an opportunity to share about Global Friends, and the professors showed astounding excitement about our ministry. God has really blessed us with incredible favor with the ILUNO program. This is key as many new international students are required to go through this program for English proficiency.



Cultural Nights. This year we have held a Chinese night, Japanese night, Korean night, and African night at one of our large home groups. All of the evenings were attractional, bringing in new students. Recently, we had African food, music, and dance with almost 80 people in attendance! Several students asked for Bibles (one Saudi Arabian, two Koreans, and one Japanese). This time of the year tends to be the most fruitful with conversions.

After we finish discussion groups, we hand out djembe drums and sing worship songs. This has been a great way of engaging students in worship, especially the African Muslims.

Easter Outreach. Recently, we had our annual Easter Outreach which is generally our largest outreach of the year. We invited an effective evangelist from the Twin Cities, Pastor Dave Gibson, to share the gospel through the Easter story. Scores of students came and many of them heard the gospel for the first time!

Afghan Ministry. We currently have great favor among the Afghan leaders in our community as they are finding that the agencies are not able to help them as much as the churches. Glory to God!



Build Up

A couple ladies from our team, and an international believer from South Sudan, started a weekly Bible study with believing internationals from Burkina Faso and Japan. The goal is for the group to be built up and to have a community to invite other international women as an evangelistic effort.

Our weekly Discovery Bible Study groups in two of our home groups are primarily led by international students. Our third group is going through a "Knowing God" video series. A new Japanese believer helps lead this group.

We are planning a two-day retreat for international believers and serious seekers at Rivercrest in May. Our theme will be "Experiencing God," and we will use some of the principles from Blackaby's book. We will also have our team and believing students share their stories of experiencing God.

Send Out

Mueller, a former international student from Tibet, is exemplary in our vision for returnees. He continues to oversee an underground church movement. We have also identified a Chinese-Tibetan who will begin to translate Christian materials like the Discovery Bible Study tool into Tibetan.

We are hearing from our new believers in China: "Our communities (underground churches) are being locked down." One community has just recently been able to meet again.

Expansion

Lincoln, NE – Lincoln has a dynamic, student-led Thursday night ministry on campus.

Okoboji, IA – We have a strong summer outreach program for the many international students who work at Okoboji in the summer. We have formed a team of interns for this year to love and minister to international students at Okoboji!

Vermillion, SD – This team recently led a student with a Muslim background to faith in Christ. He is growing and recently told the pastor of the church he is attending about his



newfound faith. The leaders at Vermillion write, "There is nothing more joyful than standing by a new believer and hearing him sing 'It is well with my soul' and then hearing him tell the pastor all about his decision."

Bellevue, **NE** – They continue a weekly international couples Bible study.

Fort Collins, CO – The team is having very deep gospel conversations every week with nonbelievers. They are continuing to see new students attend their outreach events.

In addition to the Bangladeshi student from South Dakota mentioned, we have seen an Afghan and a Jordanian come to know the Lord! All glory to Jesus!!

Thankful for your partnership in the gospel.

"ADAPTING TO NEW GLOBAL REALITIES"

Alliance Missions - Timothy D. Crouch, Vice President

The Lord continues to entrust and empower our Alliance family with a significant role in the harvest. Over the past year, 722 Alliance international workers have been active in 63 nations around the globe. This is the fruit of faithful responses to God's call upon churches in districts like yours. Alliance Missions functions to extend and empower your reach to peoples of the world who need the gospel and who are in a position to share it with others.

RENEWED POSTURE OF ALLIANCE MISSIONS

Since Council 2019, we've encouraged full embrace of the broad set of vocations and modes of ministry needed in today's world. What we call "The New Face of Alliance Missions" really amounts to recognition that we've innovated for the sake of least reached and most vulnerable peoples. It is vital that we remain focused on the important Alliance outcome of raising up church networks that multiply and carry the gospel to the remaining unreached. But we won't likely get to plant churches if we don't come to serve. Thus, CAMA's development specialists and marketplace ministries professionals, alongside the mixed-profession but church-planting focused aXcess teams, are even more vital today than in past decades. And Envision's ministries in more than twenty cities worldwide contribute to this synergy and provide ways for many others to explore and grow in their own sense of calling within these ministry contexts. The international workers of these four specialized structures of Alliance Missions are all products of your churches and worthy of your support and partnership.

REALIGNED PROCESS FOR FUNDING THE MISSION

It is this embrace of all our mission efforts and workers, and of the two strong currents of giving among Alliance people, that have driven our redesign of the Great Commission Fund. Our goal is to align all our international workers more strategically with benefit from both general and specific giving preferences of donors and churches. This allows churches like yours to continue your giving traditions while motivating new participants and deepening generosity—whether it comes from giving to the whole or focusing on a specific worker's ministry. The funding message of our workers is becoming more harmonized as they clarify both the "ask" and the benefits for both general and specific giving. We are thankful that the new process is creating overall lift. Because both types of giving are vital to all workers and their ministries, we encourage churches not to venture too far too fast from previous giving patterns. At the same time, freedom exists to grow giving by appealing to church attendees and other potential donors to give in a way most naturally motivating for them.

REDEMPTIVE PRESENCE IN A SHAKEN WORLD

In our world, upended by crisis and polarized by ideology, the redemptive presence of the gospel through the lives, love, and language of God's people is desperately needed. Where the Church is, there is hope. But where the Church isn't, we send our called ones just as our Father sent His Son to us.

This year, challenges to missionary presence continued to rise. At any given time, about ten percent of our IW staff are kept from being where they long to minister. One team of workers had to be removed from a beloved and fruitful medical ministry location because of extremist threats.

But when one door closes, God opens others.

- Fresh opportunity is being explored among very unreached people groups of one nation with few believers that holds missionary graves from previous seasons' attempts.
- As a result of the past two years' disruption, there is a major reorientation of strategies among one of the world's largest language groups.
- New works have been launched in Japan, Europe, and both Central and South Asia.
- Many new doors that were opened to receive food and medical aid through the
 pandemic remain open now for local believers and international workers who are seen
 as trusted and caring.
- Church networks of the Alliance World Fellowship brought help and hope to many in what was the most far-reaching and impactful instance of their global collaboration ever.
- Many of those same churches of our Alliance worldwide family are now sending
 international workers of their own, extending gospel presence to places where none of
 us could go.

God is faithful in His purposes. Years like this past one teach us that God's ways are not frustrated by, but rather often propelled by moments of crisis, change, or challenge. His mission will not fail, nor will those who are emboldened by His faithfulness. May we always be among them!

"ADVANCING MISSION IN THE MIDST OF A CHANGING ENVIRONMENT"

Church Ministries - Terry D. Smith, Vice President

When we reflect on the last couple of years, the phrase "changing environment" may seem like an understatement. In March 2020, church life instantly changed. As the year went by, things became more challenging. Numerous debates sprang up in the Church over the various ramifications of COVID-19, over how or whether the Church should respond to racial injustice, and over political debates that surrounded the presidential election. Most church leaders spent 2021 trying to figure out the state of their churches—who was with them, and who was not.

Thank you, pastors and leaders, for enduring these challenging months as you sought to continue advancing the mission! Be reminded by Revelation 2:1 that Jesus walks among His churches. His presence is with you. He is aware of your situation and knows your struggle. He is present in power to help you and your church. He is continuing to do His work through your ministry endeavors despite everything that is going on in our nation and world. Please know that your Alliance leaders have a deep appreciation for your faithfulness and perseverance.

While we are awaiting the results of the 2021 Local Alliance Church Annual Report, we are encouraged by some big picture outcomes of the year. There were 58 new expressions of Alliance churches (church plants, multi-sites, affiliated churches) in the United States. 52 of those were either new plants or multi-sites, which exceeded our annual goal of 50. Additionally, we anticipate that 48 new projects will lead to church plants, and they entered a pipeline that now contains 125 projects. Our church closure rate dropped from 2.8 percent to 2.2 percent. We finished the year with a net gain of six churches. After a few years of net losses, both 2019 and 2021 have both shown net gains. We're praying that this is a new positive trend, since every local church brings a gospel presence to the community where it exists.

Much has been written on the post-COVID recovery of the Church with various conclusions being drawn. Whichever voices are right or wrong, the One who is Lord of the Church has not changed; His assigned mission for us, His Church, remains the same, and His promise to build His Church is unwavering. As we make sure our eyes are on Him, I believe that advancing mission in our current environment will require a refocus in at least three ways.

REFOCUS ON THE GOSPEL AND THE KINGDOM OF GOD

I recently spoke with a pastor from the Middle East who leads a network of house churches. In his country, the Church has no influence in government, and Christians have no religious freedom. Evangelism is illegal. Yet, he and his fellow believers are engaged in sharing the gospel despite the risk and are seeing people come to faith in Christ. Meanwhile, the Church in the United States is often too focused on our influence with government and seeking to maintain religious liberty—which by and large, we already have. Evangelism is legal, and we have vast amounts of freedom to live out and share our faith. Yet, too often, we do not steward that freedom well. The Church in the United States needs to refocus on the Kingdom of God over the kingdom of this world. We need to refocus

on the gospel of Jesus Christ as the only message that brings hope and change. May the Lord grant you His wisdom and courage to engage your community with the gospel.

REFOCUS ON DISCIPLING DISCIPLEMAKERS

In mid-2021, I spoke with an Alliance pastor who had been in his current assignment only a few years. He had led the church in undertaking a relocation and replanting process. The church was growing, but with COVID-related issues, they had lost a sizeable percentage of their congregation. He said, "We didn't have time to disciple them well enough to weather the storm." His short time in the church provided a legitimate excuse; however, I believe many of our churches need to own up to not discipling people well enough. We must get refocused on intentional and intensive discipleship—to make sure people are grounded in the Word and mobilized to share it. In this way, we teach them to experience life in the Spirit, help them clarify to which King and Kingdom our allegiance belongs, and help them have a sharp focus on our mission as disciples to be disciplemakers. I encourage local church leadership teams to spend time prayerfully asking how they can disciple people so that they have deeper roots and broader influence for Christ's Kingdom.

REFOCUS ON LIVING IN THE FLOW OF THE SPIRIT'S POWER

In a recent EquippingU Podcast interview, we spoke with the leaders of an Alliance church in Aliquippa, Pennsylvania, a 100+ year-old church that is being revitalized. As they seek to fulfill the mission of Christ, they are placing a good Alliance emphasis on experiencing all the gifts and manifestations of the Spirit. They are being used by the Lord as conduits of the supernatural power of the Spirit. Even in the midst of this crazy season, they are seeing people's lives transformed and are multiplying themselves in new expressions of the church. Speaking of a changing environment, more and more people in the context we live in are unchurched and disbelieving in God and His truth. In this environment, ministry in the natural won't cut it. We must get refocused on living and walking in the Spirit, moving in His power, and being open to His supernational manifestations. As in the days of the Early Church, only Spirit-empowered believers will be conduits of transformation as Jesus intends. May the Lord grant you bold faith to step into all that the Lord wants to do in and through your church.

Our Lord is sovereign and seated firmly on His throne. He is allowing and using what is going on around us in a way that will ultimately advance His purpose. Often, times of crisis cause us to reevaluate what we're doing, to make necessary changes and adjustments, and to sharpen our focus on His mission for us. May this be the case as we continue to navigate these unprecedented times.
